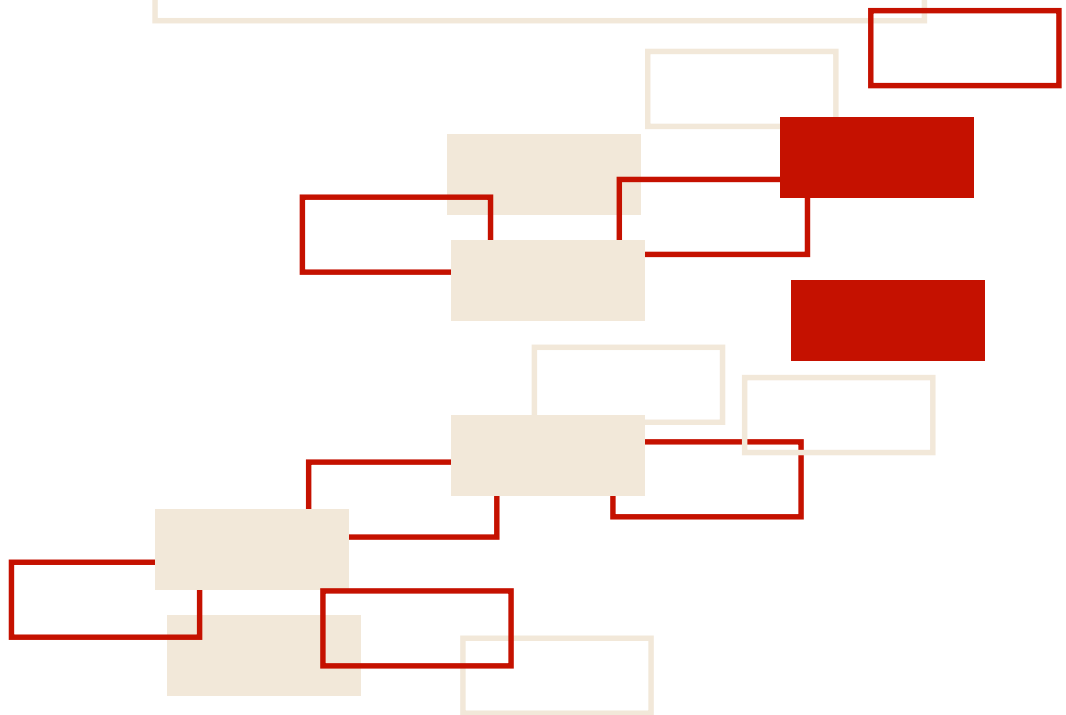

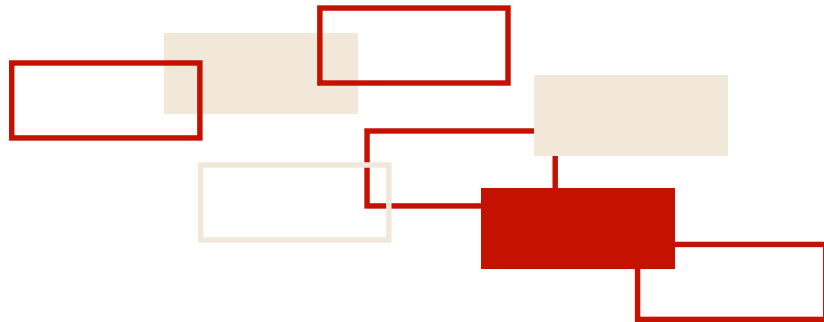

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About the University Student Outcomes Project

Since 1995, British Columbia's public universities have been tracking baccalaureate graduates, both two and five years after graduation,* through the University Baccalaureate Graduate Survey. Information about graduates' education satisfaction and financing as well as further education and employment outcomes are gathered through the survey. Five universities are currently participating in the project:

- University of British Columbia
- Simon Fraser University
- University of Victoria
- University of Northern British Columbia
- Royal Roads University**

The universities, together with The University Presidents' Council and the Ministry of Advanced Education collaborate on the project. The project is funded by the Ministry of Advanced Education and managed under contract by the Centre for Education Information Standards and Services.

Objectives of the BC University Baccalaureate Graduate Survey (UBGS)

The UBGS has been designed to gather information on graduates' education satisfaction levels, education financing and student debt as well as further education and employment outcomes. The purpose for gathering these data is:

- to meet the demand for university accountability at the system level in BC
- to gather timely and relevant data for use in program evaluation and planning processes
- to ensure that new, continuing and prospective students are provided with information they can use to help them make informed career decisions

The above goals are met through timely and thoughtful data collection, data management, and outcomes reporting. Both the two-year and the five-year UBGS survey instruments contain a core set of standardized questions, and in 2000 a relational database was constructed to house UBGS data. A rigorous data validation routine, also implemented in 2000, checks and standardizes the data ensuring accuracy and integrity over time. Accurate, standardized questions stored in a central database work to maximize the data reporting potential of the project and make it possible to conduct trend analysis of the data. Finally, the addition of a special-questions section provides for the opportunity to conduct research into specific issues or topics of interest. The core questionnaire sections are:

- Reasons for Enrolling and Education Satisfaction
- Education Evaluation and Skill Development
- Participation in Further Education
- Labour Market Participation
- Education Financing and Debt Load
- Special Questions
- Demographics and Equity

The Purpose of this Report

The following report presents summary survey results—by program classification and by institution—from the survey conducted in the fall of 2001 with 1996 baccalaureate graduates five years after graduation. From the total survey cohort of 9,531 graduates, 5,449 responded to the survey, representing a gross response rate of 57 percent. International students, medical and dental students, and students living outside of North America were excluded from the survey frame.

The results presented in this report are displayed in a two-page template format by program classification for each university and for all universities combined. The following core information is presented for each of the 13 program classification groupings (see Appendix A to review program groupings):

- Respondent Demographics
- Education Satisfaction
- Further Education Summary
- Education Financing
- Debt Load
- Employment Summary
- Labour Force Occupation and Salary Details
- Skills in Labour Market
- Changes Over Time - 1996 Graduates 1 and 5 Years Out

Reports were not produced for groupings in which there were less than 7 respondents. As well, labour force occupation and salary data is not shown in cases where $n < 2$ (or, for UBC, where $n < 5$), to ensure that no respondent may be uniquely identified. Program and occupation classification details and definitions, as well as detailed response frequency tables by institution and program area, can be found in the appendices at the back the report. 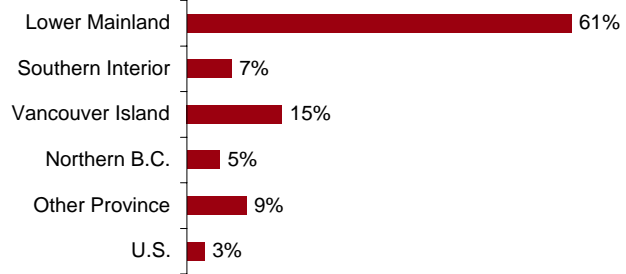

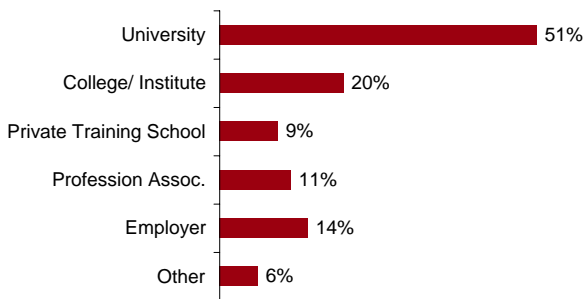

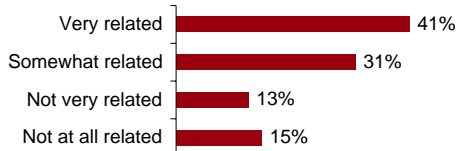

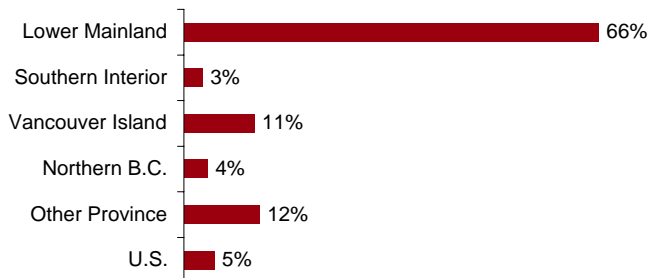

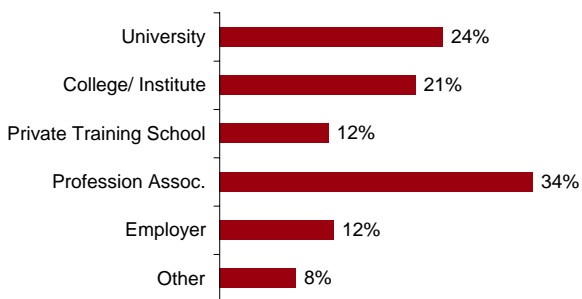

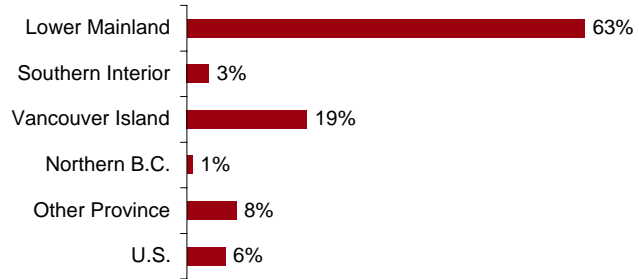

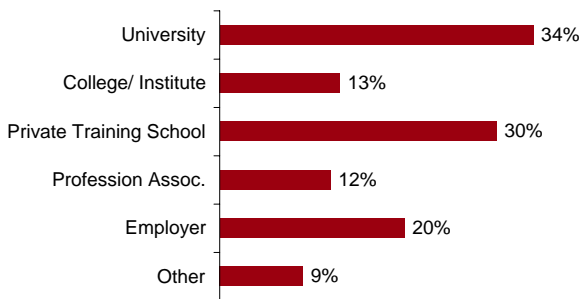

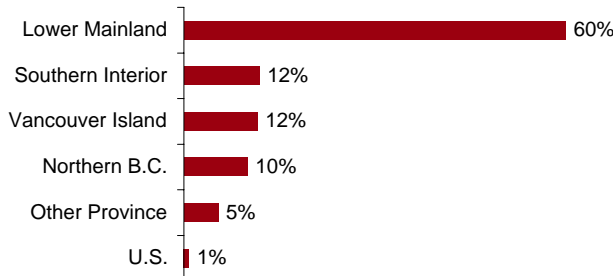

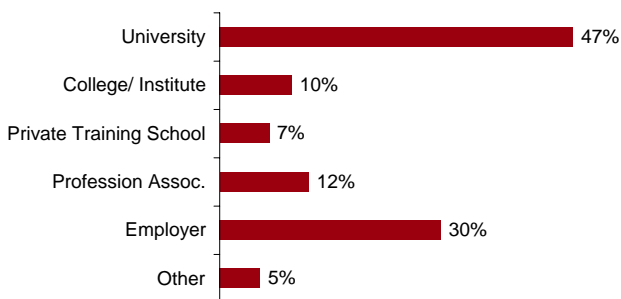

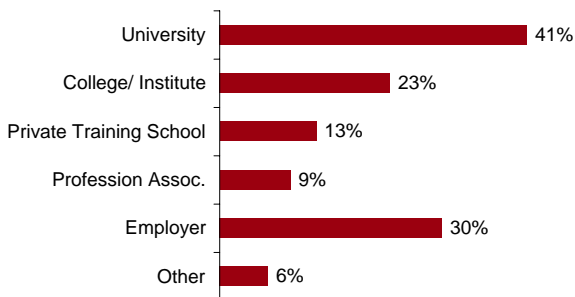

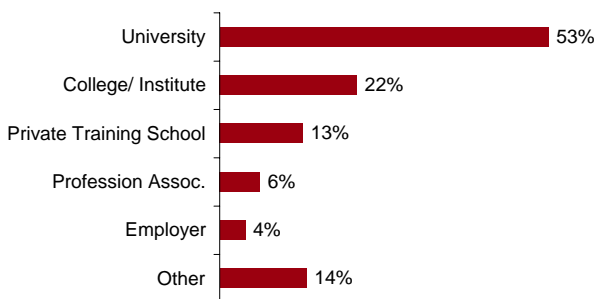

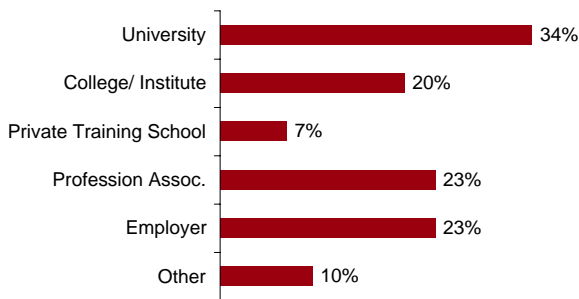

Appendix A

Classification of Instructional Program (CIP)

The Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP) provides a comprehensive and detailed standard for reporting graduate outcomes by program area. This classification system has been adopted by Statistics Canada and many other government reporting agencies in the United States.

The CIP coding scheme is organized on three levels: 2-digit series, 4-digit series, and 6-digit program code. The 2-digit series is a logical grouping of related programs. The 4-digit series is an intermediate aggregation of programs with comparable program content and objectives. The 6-digit program code is the most detailed program classification within the classification system and represents a single instructional program.

Example:

The 6-digit CIP code for Biochemistry is 26.0202.

The 4-digit intermediate aggregation is Biochemistry, Biophysics and Molecular Biology (26.02).

The 2-digit logical grouping is Biological and Biomedical Sciences (26).

Since 1995, B.C. university graduate survey results have been classified into one of eight different program areas, independent of the CIP coding structure. These program areas included Arts, Applied Sciences, Business, Education, Fine and Performing Arts, Health, Science, and Social Professions. Starting with the 2000 survey results, the University Student Outcomes Project has classified the respondents according to the CIP coding scheme. For this report, the 2-digit logical groupings have been further aggregated into fifteen Program Classifications to reduce the total number of program areas and to increase the number of respondents in any one program area for reporting purposes. Of the fifteen Program Classifications created, thirteen are reported. Table 1 describes the aggregation of 2-digit CIP's into the fifteen USOP Program Classifications.

Appendix B

The National Occupation Classification (NOC)

From the document, National Occupation Classification Occupational Descriptions, published by Human Resources Development Canada.

The National Occupation Classification (NOC) is a systematic taxonomy of occupations in the Canadian labour market. It is based on extensive occupational research, analysis, and consultation conducted across the country. The NOC is intended for use in compiling, analyzing, and communicating information about occupations. There are approximately 25,000 occupational titles included in the NOC.

The two major attributes of jobs which were used as classification criteria in developing the NOC were skill level and skill type.

1. **Skill Level** is defined generally as the amount and type of education and training required to enter and perform the duties of an occupation. Four skill level categories are identified in the NOC; the criteria for each level are as follows:

Skill Level A Professional Occupations

- University degree (bachelor's, master's, or postgraduate)

Skill Level B Technical, Paraprofessional, and Skilled Occupations

- Two to three years of post-secondary education at a community college, institute of technology, or CEGEP or
- Two to four years of apprenticeship training or
- Three to four years of secondary school and more than two years of on-the-job training, training courses, or specific work experience
- Occupations with supervisory responsibilities are assigned to skill level B
- Occupations with significant health and safety responsibilities (e.g., fire fighters, police officers, and registered nursing assistants) are assigned to skill level B

Skill Level C Intermediate Occupations

- One to four years of secondary school education
- Up to two years of on-the-job training, training courses, or specific work experience

Skill Level D Labouring and Elemental Occupations

- Up to two years of secondary school and short work demonstration or on-the-job training

Management occupations are not assigned to a skill level category because factors other than education and training (e.g., previous experience, capital) are often more significant determinants for employment.

Appendix E

Technical Notes Relating to the Reports

Unless otherwise noted, denominators for the percentages provided in the reports include only cases where a valid response was provided (i.e. “Don’t Know” and “Refused” responses have been excluded). However, percentages provided may not always add up to one hundred percent, due to rounding.

Respondent Demographics

Current Residence – Cases where the current residence is unknown are not reported in this graph. The denominator for this element is the total number of respondents for whom current residential data is available.

Education Satisfaction

Goal Achievement; Level of Satisfaction with Education Received – Percentages cited are of those who provided valid responses.

Further Education Summary

Where respondents took further education – Percentages cited are of those respondents who took further education. Because multiple responses were allowed for location, totals may exceed one hundred percent.

Top 5 reasons for enrolling in further studies – Percentages cited are of total reasons provided. Because respondents were permitted to specify a reason for each type of further education in which they had enrolled, the total number of reasons may exceed the total number of respondents.

Education Financing

Top 3 Main Sources of Education Financing – Where respondents cited more than one source, “main” source was considered to be that with the highest specified percentage of importance. Where equal percentages of importance were specified, the source cited first was considered the “main” source.

Employment Summary

In the Labour Force – Includes respondents who are either currently employed or are actively seeking employment.

Of those employed – Full-time and part-time percentages are of employed respondents who provided data on number of hours worked. For this reason, full-time plus part-time percentages cited total one hundred percent.

Labour Force Occupation and Salary Details

Top 10 Full-time Occupations of Graduates – Percentages cited are of those for whom occupational data was provided.

Skills in Labour Market

Extent to Which Skill is Used in Performing Duties of Main Job – Percentages cited are of those who provided a valid response.

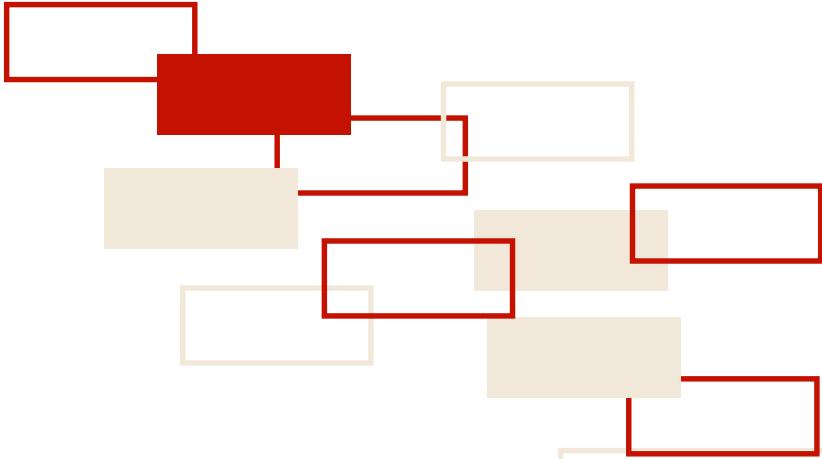
Changes Over Time - 1996 Graduates 1 and 5 Years Out

Full-time (of those employed) – The 1997 percentage cited was derived by dividing the total number of 1997 respondents working full-time by the total number of 1997 respondents working either part-time or full-time. Likewise, the 2001 percentage was derived by dividing the total number of 2001 respondents working full-time by the total number of 2001 respondents working either part-time or full-time.

Annual Full-time Income (Median) – The 1997 median reported is of all those working full-time in 1997 who provided income data and the 2001 median reported is of all those working full-time in 2001 who provided income data.

Would Take Program Again – In 1997, respondents were asked, “given your experience since completing your bachelor’s program, would you select the same program again?” The percentage reported for 1997 is the number of “yes” responses divided by the number of “yes” responses plus the number of “no” responses. In 2001, respondents were asked, “Given your experiences since graduation, would you select [name of program] again?” The percentage reported for 2001 is the number of “yes” responses divided by the number of “yes” responses plus the number of “no” responses.

Although many graduates were surveyed in both 1997 and 2001, others were surveyed in only one of the two survey years. As a result, the denominators of the percentages reported vary by year, and the median salary amounts reported are based on different sets of respondents.
